## Football in Exile

The geopolitical conflict in the Nagorno Karabakh region is a forgotten one. Yet, for hundreds of thousands Azerbaijani and Armenian refugees it represents a daily reality since the 1991-1994 war. Photographer Dirk-Jan Visser and writer Arthur Huizinga tell the story from the perspective of six people related to two football teams.

FK Qarabağ Ağdam is an Azerbaijani football club currently based in the capital Baku, longing to return to its home ground in the destroyed and occupied city of Ağdam. The club is the symbol of hope and pride for over half a million Azerbaijani refugees scattered around Azerbaijan.

The Armenian team FK Karabakh Stepanakert from the capital of Nagorno Karabakh is banned from competition. FIFA does not recognise teams from unrecognised states: a catastrophe for the team that was once champion of the Azerbaijani zone of Soviet football.

As Azerbaijan grows richer with every oil shipment and Armenia sinks further into economic isolation, the conflict will be back on the international agenda sooner rather than later.
